#### 3. UPDATE HCTT AND ROHINGYAS CRISIS

#### **HCTT update**:

## **Rohingyas crisis**

- JRP project proposals OPS upload: 21 projects received
  - ✓ National NGOs: 7
  - ✓ UN Agencies: 5
  - ✓ INGOs: 9
  - ✓ Objective one: Food assistance/Life-saving activities 6 organizations
  - ✓ Objective two: livelihoods/self-reliance: 21 organizations
- Pre-assistance baseline data: REVA to be published soon
- Market price monitoring: on-going
- Emergency plan for Cyclone/monsoon based on 3 levels of emergency
- Round 9 completed: 4 to 19<sup>th</sup> February, WFP and 7 NGOs (3 NGOs complementary food assistance): Total of 183,639 HHs
- Round 10: 22<sup>nd</sup> February to 7<sup>th</sup> March, WFP and 6 NGOs (2 NGOs complementary food assistance)

#### Discussion:

# MPCG

- The MPCG rate has been reviewed with 2 rates: one specific for CXB/CHT and one for the rest of Bangladesh. It is for Bangladeshi only (i.e. not including Rohingyas)
- The MPCG rate is not yet endorsed by the HCTT.
- There is a different CWG in CXB which works on MPCG and MEB.

Market price monitoring: lot of discussion about prices decrease and increase due to General food distribution and inflation due to Rohingyas presence. Damien clarified that the market price monitoring is a tool to monitor the price, not only for the food items but for other items: hygiene, wood, bamboo, etc. and it monitors also if the functionality of the markets. A strong recommendation also was from participants to link market price monitoring data with the advocacy and influence for suitable Govt regulations and take appropriate measures from Govt level to control/ease market prices particularly those are essential items for disaster affected population.

<u>Project proposal</u>: contrary to other emergencies, the project proposal for this disaster does not provide access to funding (pooled fund). The number of projects submitted by local NGOs is not due to an allocated percentage as per the localisation agenda.

#### 4. Presentation of TWG-revision of the FSC package

Damien presented the results of the TWG on the revision of the FSC package.

The TWG proposed to change the short-term food ration as it does not follow the Sphere standards It recommends the following proposition:

10.1% energy from protein (recommended 10-12%)

19.1% energy from fat (recommended 17%)

# **Discussion:**

- Most of the attendants did not agree the proposed package because the quantity of lentils was too high. They proposed to reduce the amount of pulse.
- Nur (FAO) indicated that lentils can be changed by other pulses. Damien responded that this was feasible though not easy for the supply chain.
- There was also some discussion regarding the kind of protein: egg, dry fish, etc. Damien responded that only dry food could be provided due to supply chain considerations. Foyzun (WFP) explained that dry fish in Bangladesh is not safe as it is contaminated by DDT. Food assistance must be safe and free from any hazardous chemical.
- Damien mentioned that the FSC should and must follow the Sphere standards.
- Participants emphasized that while we are respectful and aiming to meet Sphere minimum standard but cultural context (preferred food items, quantity, quality, dietary habit, etc.) of the affected people also important need to take into consideration to select food items into minimum food basket.
- NAHAB can send an email to its member organisation in 8 division and request them to provide information of local food habit so that other options can be taken into account.
- Damien indicated that most of the organisations did not distribute food in kind but food assistance in cash. So, we should use this package and monetize it.

It was finally agreed that the TWG will meet again to make another proposition with the required experts and participation from nutrition cluster. FAO proposed to invite university professors with nutrition background.

Damien suggested that the staff coming to the TWG must have the necessary qualification and expertise as well as being decision maker within their own organisation.
